

Dear Representative Pingree:

Thank you for your letter dated January 17, 2014, to W. Craig Fugate, Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Department of Homeland Security, on behalf of your constituents in Cumberland and York Counties, Maine. In your letter, you requested that technical data used in the creation of preliminary Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) for Cumberland and York Counties be forwarded to local jurisdictions for their review. You also asked that locally generated data be considered for use in the ongoing Risk Mapping, Assessment and Planning (Risk MAP) study for these counties.

Throughout a Flood Insurance Study (FIS), FEMA seeks to actively engage and develop a strong working relationship with the State and local communities that will be impacted by the revised FIRM. In coordination with local representatives in Cumberland and York Counties, FEMA committed to deliver the technical data used in the FIS following the release of the preliminary FIRMs. Consistent with this promise, on January 8, 2014, FEMA's Region I office provided the technical data used in the creation of the preliminary FIRMs to the consultant working on behalf of several towns in Cumberland and York Counties. When performing an FIS, FEMA considers a State and its local governments as partners and invites these jurisdictions to participate at all stages of the development of the new or revised FIRM. Aligned with this intention, FEMA treats the FIRM as a living document and encourages State and local partners to provide more precise, local data to be evaluated for use on a final FIRM. As noted in your correspondence, FEMA has incorporated data from local sources for communities that submitted information determined to meet the appropriate requirements. FEMA is committed to providing an equal opportunity for data submittal for the communities involved in the ongoing Risk MAP study and to ensuring that the evaluation process remains fair and transparent, consistent with both current FEMA Guidelines and Standards and the requirements outlined in the *Code of Federal Regulations*, Title 44, Chapter I, Part 67. To help communities and their contractors understand the required data standards, FEMA Region I has met several times with communities in York and Cumberland Counties, either in person or on conference calls, and held webinars for local officials. These activities were designed to encourage communities to review the FIRM and provide feedback, to emphasize the need for those with detailed local knowledge to be part of the review process, and to explain technical approaches.


It is important to emphasize that the information shown on the preliminary FIRMs for Cumberland and York Counties is not considered finalized at this time. FEMA provides a formal opportunity for data submittal through the appeal period for those communities impacted by proposed changes to the FIRM during the revision process. If additional technically appropriate data are available from State or local sources, this information should be forwarded to FEMA for review. Information submitted for consideration should be coordinated with FEMA's Region I office in Boston via the contact information provided above.

Following the appeal period, if a community believes that the technical issues that were raised have not been adequately addressed, a Scientific Resolution Panel (SRP) can be made available to support the resolution process. SRPs are independent panels of experts in hydrology, hydraulics, and other pertinent sciences established to review conflicting scientific and technical data and provide recommendations for resolution. An SRP is an option after FEMA and a local community have been engaged in a collaborative consultation process without a mutually acceptable resolution. SRPs are made available only for submissions that meet the specific eligibility requirements outlined in FEMA Procedure Memorandum 58, *Implementing the Scientific Resolution Panel*.

FEMA also encourages communities to submit modeling information, as it becomes available, following an FIS for areas where FIRMs have been adopted as effective, through other appropriate mechanisms, such as the Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) process. In addition, residents can pursue amendments to the effective mapping information through the Letter of Map Amendment (LOMA) process.
